Description:

The International Order of Good Templars (IOGT) Hall faces north toward the road, just east of Daisy Road. The building is a one-story, three-bay by four-bay frame structure with a rubble stone foundation, German siding, and a gable roof that has standing-seam metal and has a north-south ridge. There is a shorter one-story wing on the south end of the building, and it has a shed roof. The north elevation has flush double doors and a boarded-up transom in the original center opening. The interior of the hall has one large open room in the main block and one room in the wing. The main room walls have a pressed metal wall covering. There is a metal frieze, above the frieze is a metal cove cornice decorated with anthemion topped by bellflowers, and there is a rope moulding in metal above the cornice. The ceiling follows the rafters and collar beams, and it is also covered in pressed metal. The gable ends have foliate pattern pressed metal. There is a large, square ceiling medallion in the center, and it has anthemion in the four corners. The building is of circular-sawn 2 by 4 construction. There are holes in the roof and much rot and rust to the building fabric.

Significance:

The IOGT grew out of the Washingtonian movement begun in Baltimore in 1840 to promote temperance. The "Order of Good Templars" was founded in Utica in 1851 but the following year a splinter group formed, named the Independent Order of Good Templars. This group later divided in 1876 over the issue of racial equality, with British members forming a separate international organization. The rift was healed in 1887 and the movement spread further throughout the world, leading to the change of the name to The International Order of Good Templars in 1905. In 1915 the trustees of the Daisy Lodge No. 380 purchased a small lot for \$50, and they presumably built the existing hall shortly afterward. The building was a veritable catalogue of pressed metal wall and ceiling panels, though the manufacturer has not been identified. It was demolished in 2006.

The International Order of Good Templars (IOGT) Hall is located at 19549 Union Chapel Road and faces north toward the road, just east of Daisy Road. The building is a one-story, three-bay by four-bay frame structure with a rubble stone foundation that has bead pointing, German siding with corner boards, all fastened with wire nails, and a gable roof that has standing-seam metal laid over board sheathing, and has a north-south ridge. There is beaded-edge-and-center board soffit on the cornice that follows the pitch of the rafters. There is a shorter one-story wing on the south end of the building, and it has a shed roof with standing seam metal, German siding, and a rubble stone foundation. It has a wood box cornice.

The north elevation has flush double doors and a boarded-up transom in the original center opening, and there is a beaded-interior-edge frame. There is a boarded-up window to each side with an identical frame and a wood sill. The gable end has a moulded cornice below fish scale shingles. There is a center window with wire mesh in it, and it has a pedimented surround with rounded dentals and a keystone motif in the center. The east elevation has four two-over-two double-hung sash with typical frames and sills. There are iron bars over the windows, most of them made of rebar, and there is a stovepipe hole with a thimble between the north and north-center bays.

The east elevation of the south wing has double doors made of butcher block, hung on T hinges. There is an exterior brick chimney on the south end of the main building, centered on the ridge. The south elevation of the wing has no openings. The west elevation of the wing has a boarded-up window opening with a typical frame and sill. The west elevation of the main block has four two-over-two sash that match the east elevation.

The interior of the hall has one large open room in the main block and one room in the wing. The main room has 3-1/4 inch pine flooring that runs north-south, and wood baseboard that is 12 inches high and has a quirked ogee and bevel on the top. The architrave has a quirked ogee and bead inside of a fascia on the back band, and has a bead on the inner edge. There are also bulls-eye corner blocks. The walls have a pressed metal wall covering with a decorative pattern of long hexagons that contain paired anthemion inside of them, the bottom anthemion being set upside down. There is a metal frieze that contains Gothic revival cusps with fleur de lies on top of them, and the cusps alternate between large and small ones. The background of the frieze has a pebbled finish. Above the frieze is a metal cove cornice decorated with anthemion topped by bellflowers, and there is a rope moulding in metal above the cornice. The ceiling follows the rafters and collar beams, and is also covered in pressed metal, with squares that have Anthemion in each corner. There is a rope moulding at the break between the rafters and collar beams. The gable ends have foliate pattern pressed metal containing patera that have four lobes each. There is a large, square ceiling medallion in the center, and it has anthemion in the four corners. The north windows match those on the east and west, and there is a three-light transom above the door. In the center above the door is a frieze that is patched or finished with a short piece of the cove cornice material. The window sash were hung on cords, have parting beads, and are not pinned. The south end of the room has a stovepipe hole in the gable end that has since been closed off. There are flush double doors to the east of the chimney and a small pass-through in the wall west of the chimney.

The rafters are approximately 2 by 6s with pieces nailed to the sides at a flatter angle than the metal ceiling is nailed to, and appear to probably be scissor braces. The roof is rotted, and missing some of its metal roofing; the pressed metal interior is very rusted, with some of it missing, and the floor is soft. The building is very deteriorated.

The wing has the same flooring as the main room, and it runs east-west. The baseboard is shorter and is plain, though one piece has an ogee and bevel on top of it. The walls have the same pressed metal as in the main room, and this covers the chimney, as well. There is a stovepipe hole with a terra cotta thimble on the south side of the chimney. The room has an egg and dart moulding on the cornice, and the ceiling has long hexagons with a single rosette in the center. The architrave matches the main room, but there is a plain board over top of the door and the window architrave has plain head-cut trim. There is a hatch cut in the

ceiling to get up to the attic, and the building is of circular-sawn 2 by 4 construction.

There are two CMU buildings at the rear of the lot that were built for garages, and are not historic.

A previous survey of this property named the building the IOOF Hall, but there is no evidence that it was ever owned by the Odd Fellows, and if they ever borrowed the building for their meetings, that is not clear from the earlier work. The International Order of Good Templars (IOGT) Hall sits near the intersection of Union Chapel Road and Daisy Road in the crossroads community of Daisy. There are numerous speculations about the source of the town name, but the most probable is that the post office there was given the name of Senator Gorman's daughter, Daisy. The focal point of the town was Mullinex's store, which had a large meeting room above it that was used for dances, and apparently for gatherings of the International Order of Good Templars. The IOGT grew out of the Washingtonian movement begun in Baltimore in 1840 to promote temperance. The "Order of Good Templars" was founded in Utica in 1851 but the following year a splinter group formed, named the Independent Order of Good Templars. This group later divided in 1876 over the issue of racial equality, with British members forming a separate international organization. The rift was healed in 1887 and the movement spread further throughout the world, leading to the change of the name to The International Order of Good Templars in 1905. In 1915 the trustees of the Daisy Lodge No. 380 purchased a small lot for \$50, and they presumably built the existing hall shortly afterward. The building is a veritable catalogue of pressed metal wall and ceiling panels, though the manufacturer has not been identified. (1)

The activities of the local chapter of the IOGT are not known.

The building was sold to Mullinex Motors in 1972 and was used for storage, but has been abandoned for many years. The roof covering has gradually been blown off, and rain has rotted much of the wood and rusted significant portions of the metal, leaving the building in poor condition. It was scheduled to be demolished in September 2006.

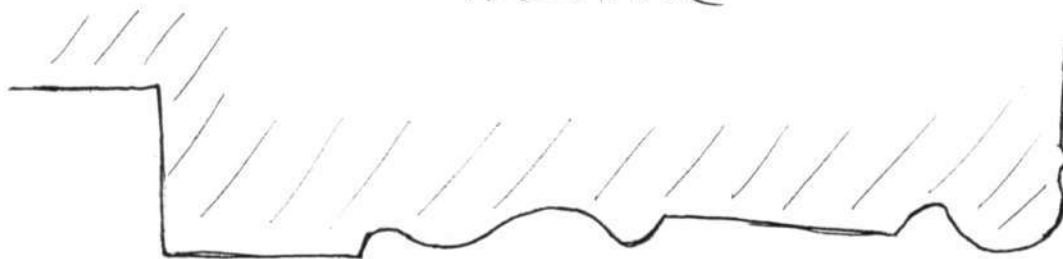

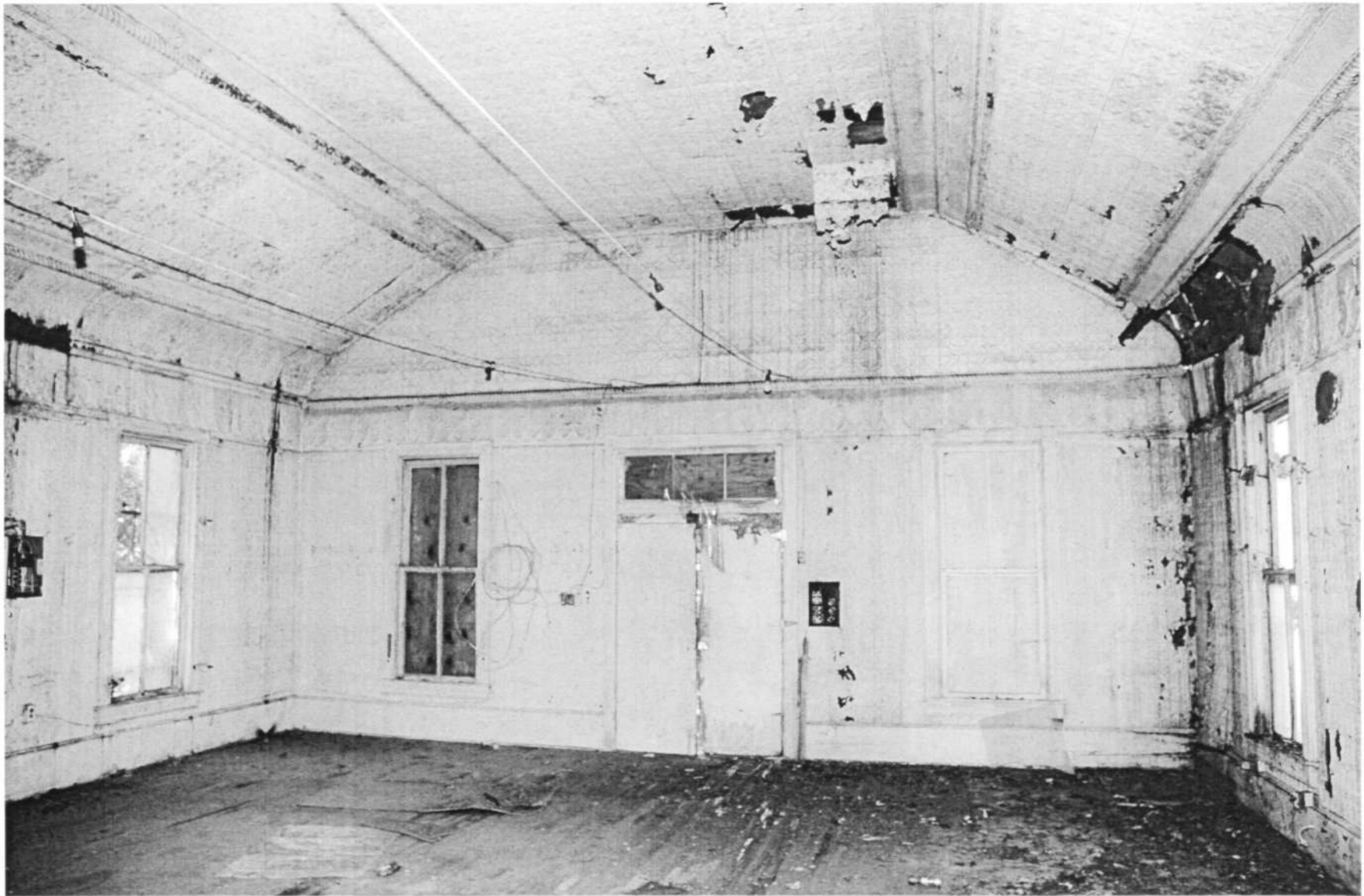

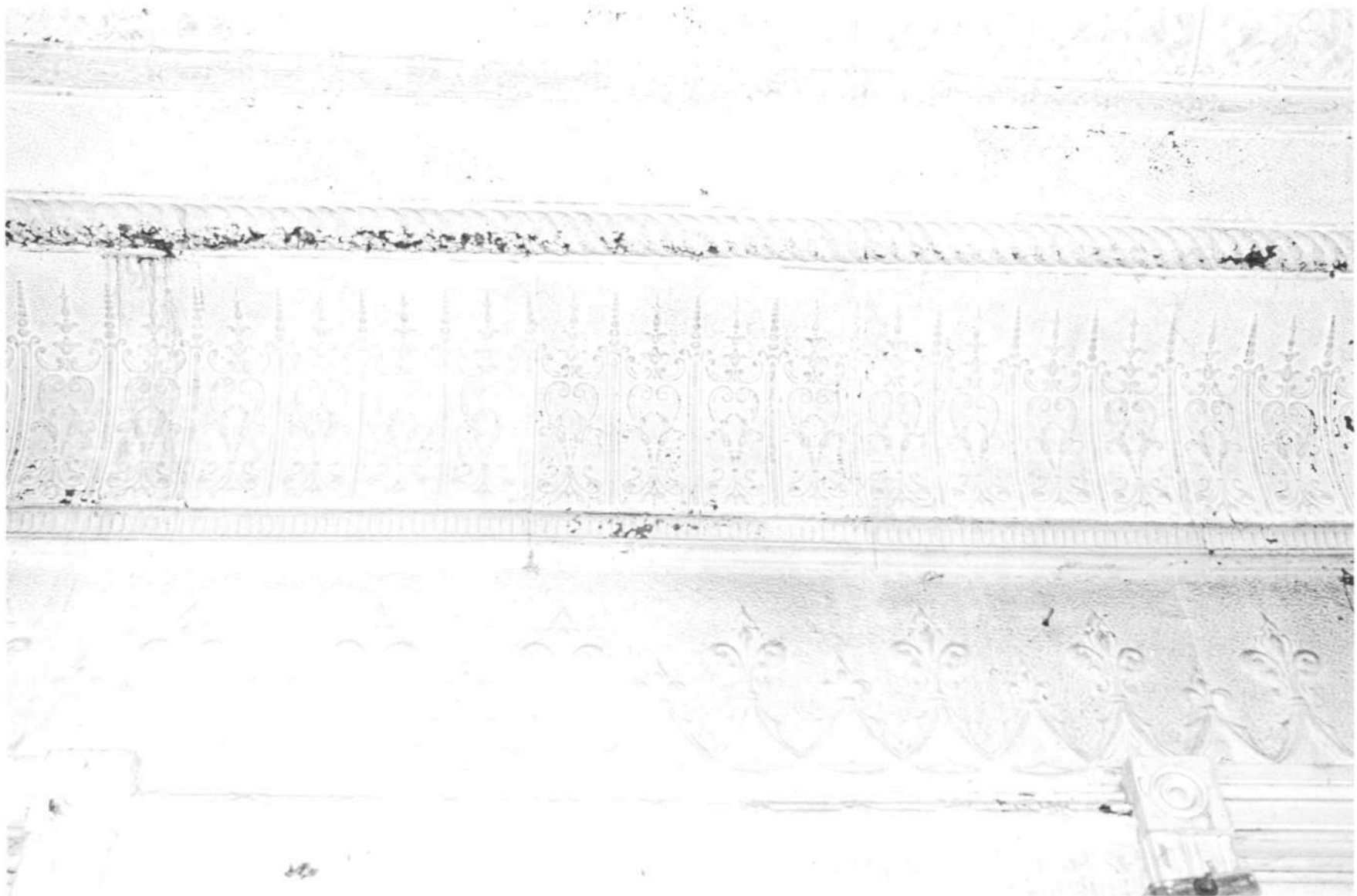

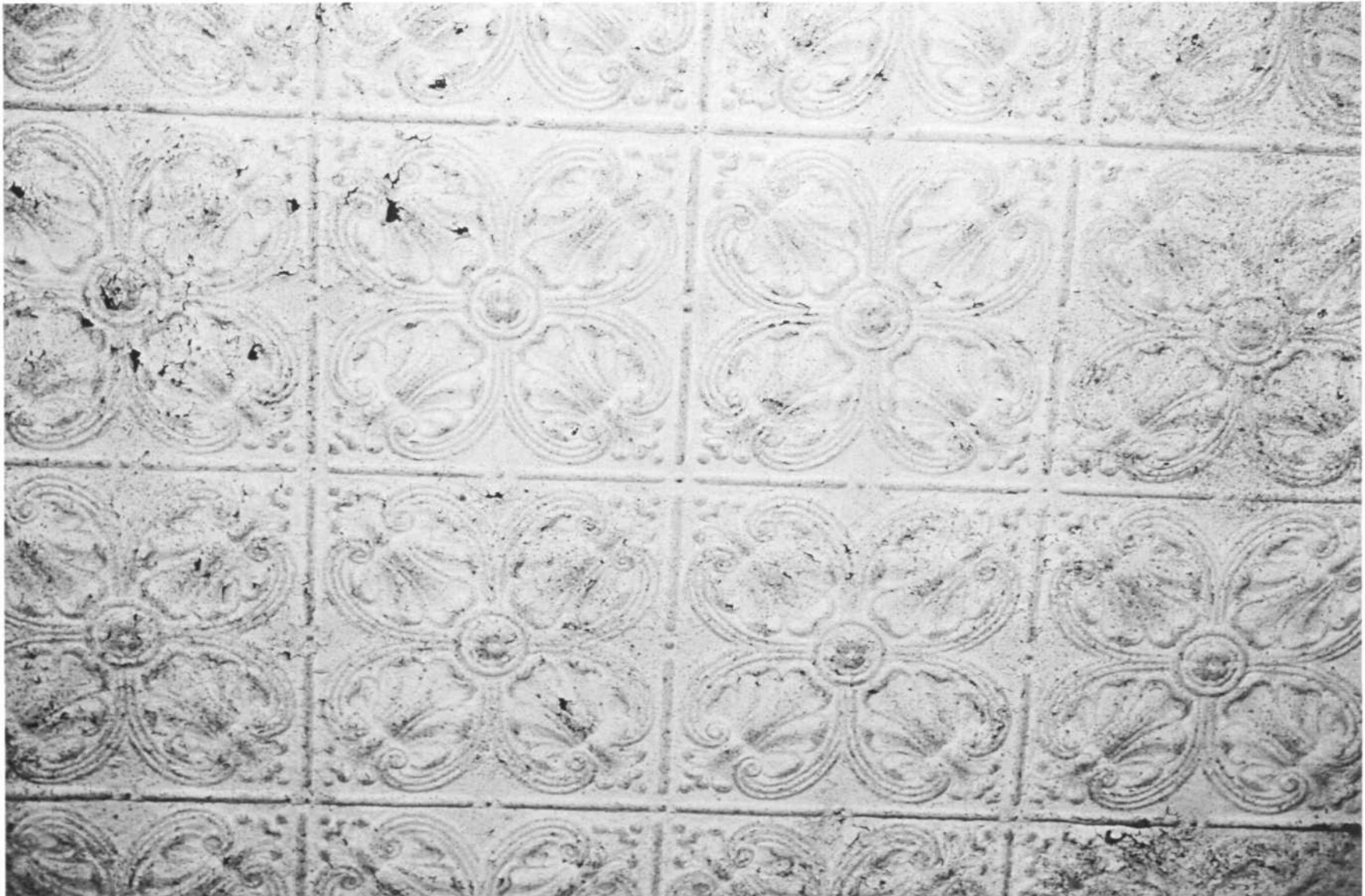

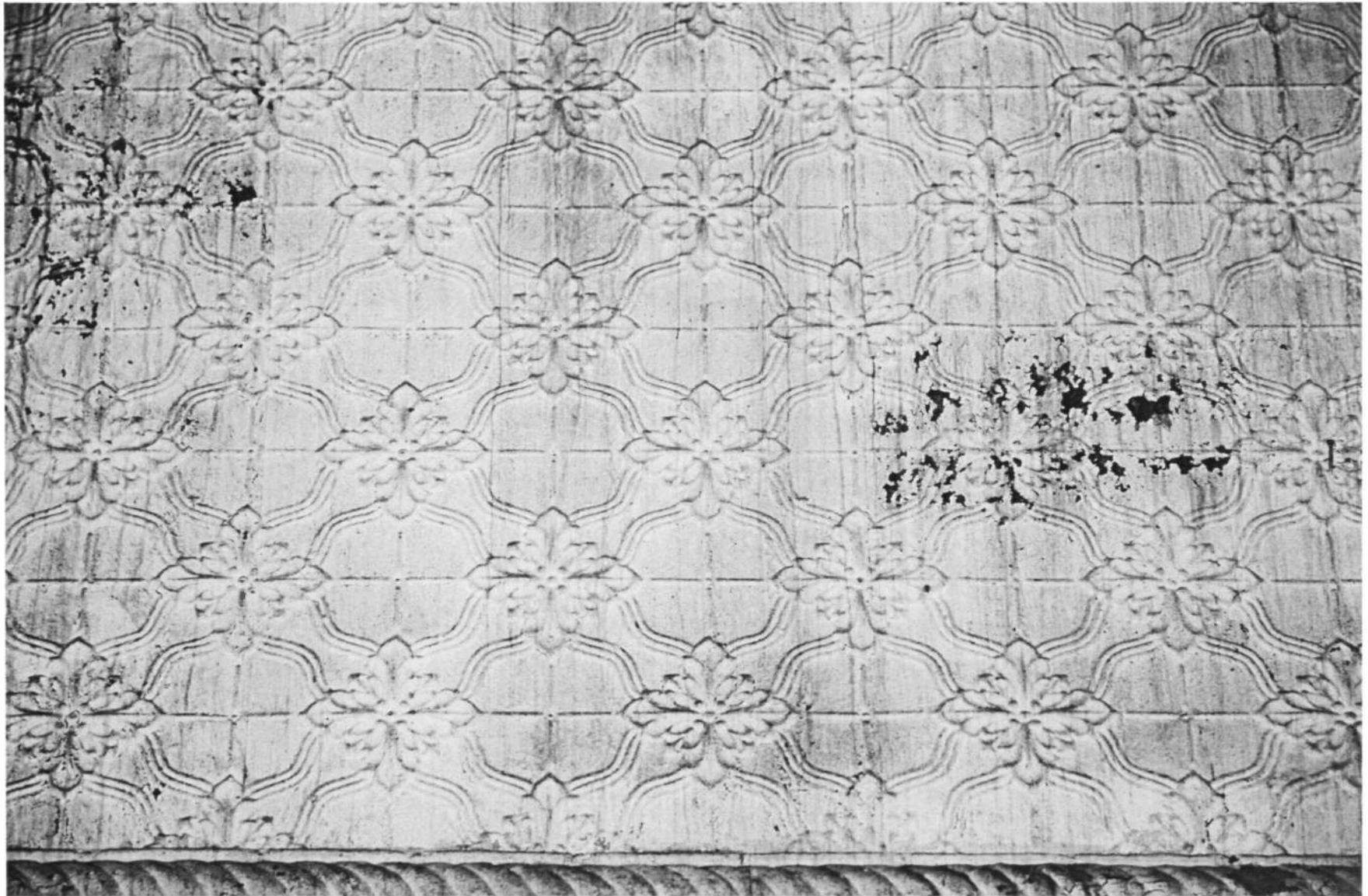

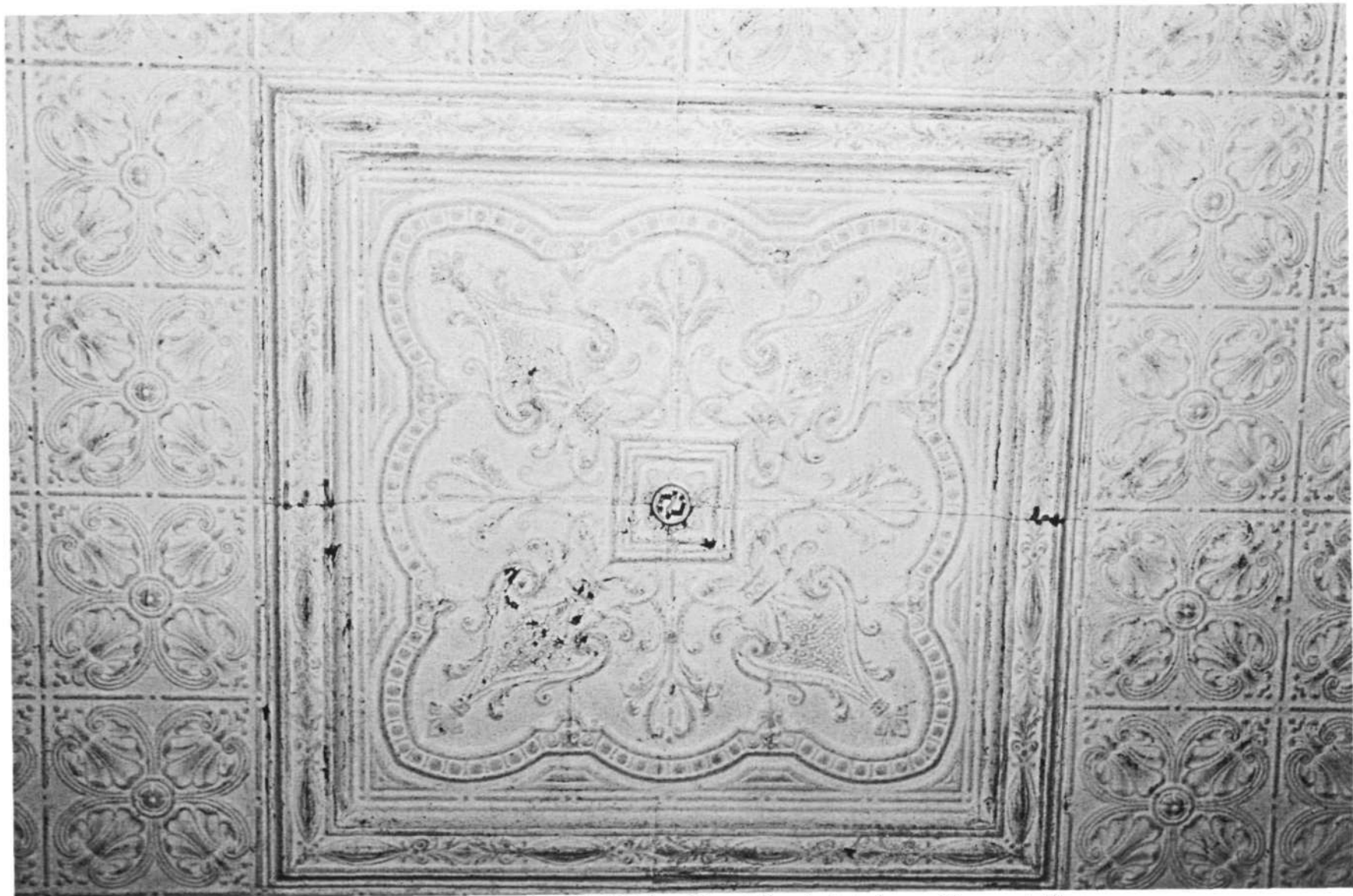

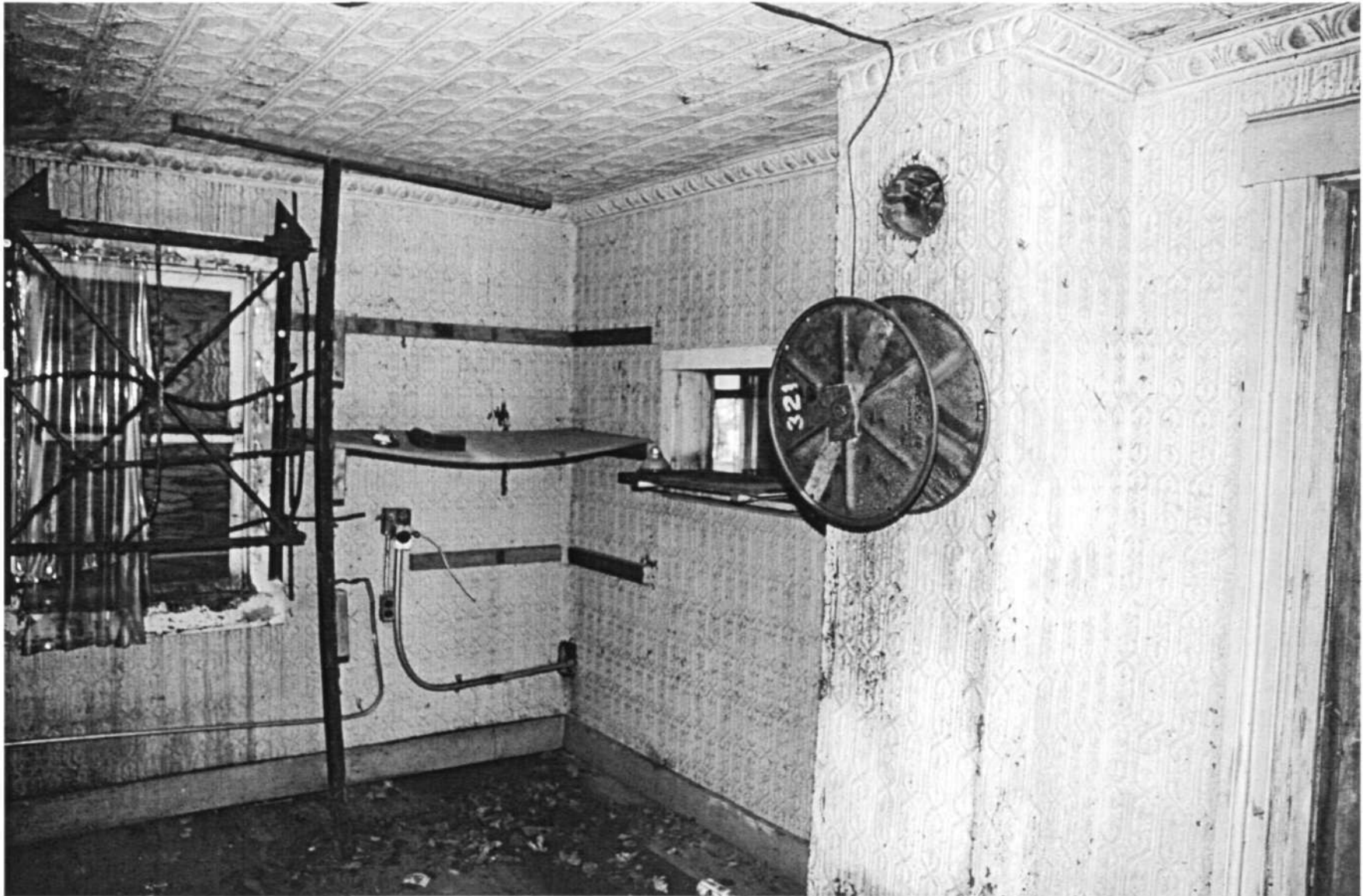

The I.O.O.F. Building faces north on the south side of Union Chapel Road about 0.1 miles east of Daisy Road. It is a three bay wide, four bay deep, one story high, gabled roof (running north-south) rectangular, frame building, covered with clapboard and shingles, and resting on a stone foundation, with square, brick chimney inset into its south elevation. The building is covered by the foliage of a fine oak tree on its east wall.

The I.O.O.F. Building in Daisy has experienced little, if any, alteration, remaining relatively intact, though not in use at the present time. The rectangular, frame, gabled roof, building block of one or two stories in height was commonly seen in both the general stores and I.O.O.F. buildings which dot the Howard County landscape, comprising one large room downstairs and if a second floor, a large room on the second floor. The Daisy I.O.O.F. Building is a good example of this vernacular building, retaining its original interior and exterior.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The IOOF Building faces north on the south side of Union Chapel Road about 0.1 miles east of Daisy Road. It is a three bay wide, four bay deep, one story high, gabled roof (running north-south) rectangular, frame building, covered with clapboard and shingles, and resting on a stone foundation, with square, brick chimney inset into its south elevation. The building is covered by the foliage of a fine oak tree on its east wall.

Windows are rectangular with double-hung sashes, holding two-over-two lights. The rectangular main entrance is a cross paneled, double door, surmounted by a three light transom, which holds the letters I.O.O.F. No. 380. The gable end above the first story is scallop-shingled and contains an arched one light, attic window, flanked by flat pilasters and surmounted by a mitre arch lintel.

The interior retains its window and door frames, which feature fluted pilasters and lintels joined at the corners by square blocks, inscribed with circles. The building is not occupied.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The I.O.O.F. building in Daisy, Howard County, Maryland, is one of the earliest buildings still standing in this community that was begun around 1893 with the construction of a general store at a country cross roads.¹ Distinction attaching to age is expanded upon by its fine example as a vernacular, frame, early twentieth century building,² and its use as a social focal point for the neighborhood,³ reflecting the evolution of this rural community from the early twentieth century to today.⁴

History and Support

1. George W. Ward and his wife Susan F. Ward, who had operated the Daisy Trading Post for the seven years between 1898 and 1905 conveyed 5 acres and 10 perches of land to Emma I. Ward in 1907 for \$1,250. Eight years later Emma I. Ward conveyed .306 acres of land for \$50.00 to the Trustees of Daisy Lodge No. 380, I.O.O.F. of Howard County, who had formerly met on the second floor of the Daisy Trading Post. It was, with the school, the Daisy Trading Post and residence, one of the first four buildings comprising the town center for this rural community of Daisy, named after Daisy Johnson.
2. The I.O.O.F. Building in Daisy has experienced little, if any, alteration, remaining relatively intact, though not in use at the present time. The rectangular, frame, gabled roof, building block of one or two stories in height was commonly seen in both the general stores and I.O.O.F. buildings which dot the Howard County Landscape, comprising one large room downstairs and if a second floor, a large room on the second floor. The Daisy I.O.O.F. Building is a good example of this vernacular building, retaining its original interior and exterior.
3. The I.O.O.F. Building in Daisy also served as a social focal point, not only in its initial use as a social hall, but in its actual construction. The entire A. E. Mullinix family was particularly involved, boarding the carpenters, furnishing the two by fours and framing material for the building and carrying daily lunches to the carpenters during construction. Later the hall was used for plays, square dances and various dinners for its active membership, which first had to "take the pledge" against the use of any alcoholic beverages what so ever. This

building, in combination with the Daisy School, directly opposite, and with its neighbor, diagonally across the street, the Daisy Trading Post, provided a concentration of buildings and services to the rural neighborhood of Daisy.

4. The I.O.O.F. building reflects the evolution of this rural community from the early twentieth century to today. As a separate social hall, it helped provide an important change from a totally rural area to one featuring a bit of town life. The early twentieth century, with its rise of the Temperance Movement and the initiation of "Prohibition", is reflected by the the I.O.O.F., an international organization, whose branches spread to almost every section of Howard County, and who took a strong line against the use of alcohol. This was coupled with a strong social organization, which attempted to meet the needs of the social animal, providing plays, dinners and dances to its members, as well as trips to large two to three day conventions, which were held from time to time at various cities. With the repeal of Prohibition the I.O.O.F. membership found it more difficult to stem the tide of social drinking and attract new members. In addition, its original membership passed on, leaving A. Robey Mullinix as the sole surviving successor, trustee and member. Today, the building stands vacant with the Trading Post, awaiting an opportunity to again serve its neighborhood and adapt to the new needs of this rural area.

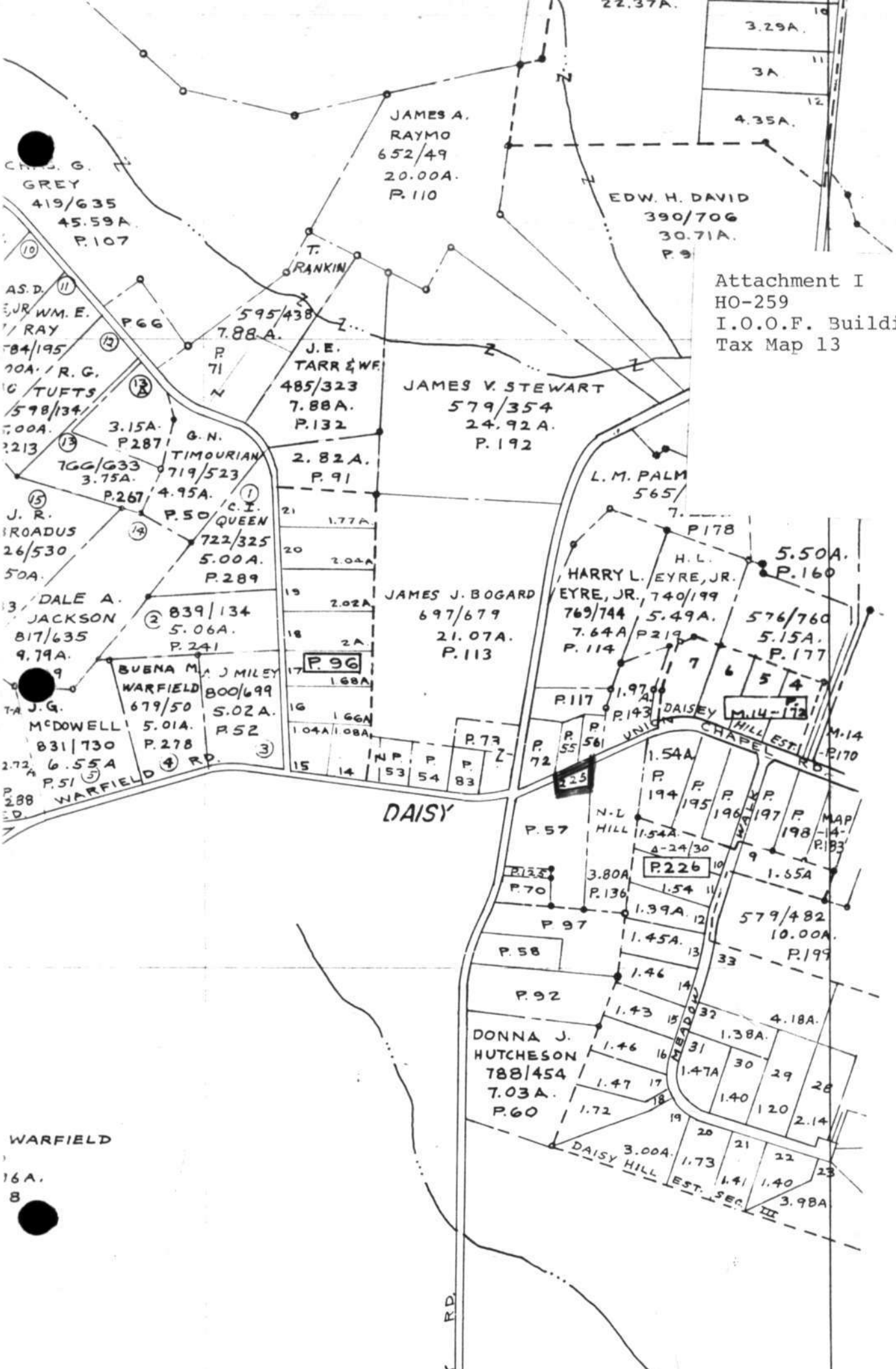

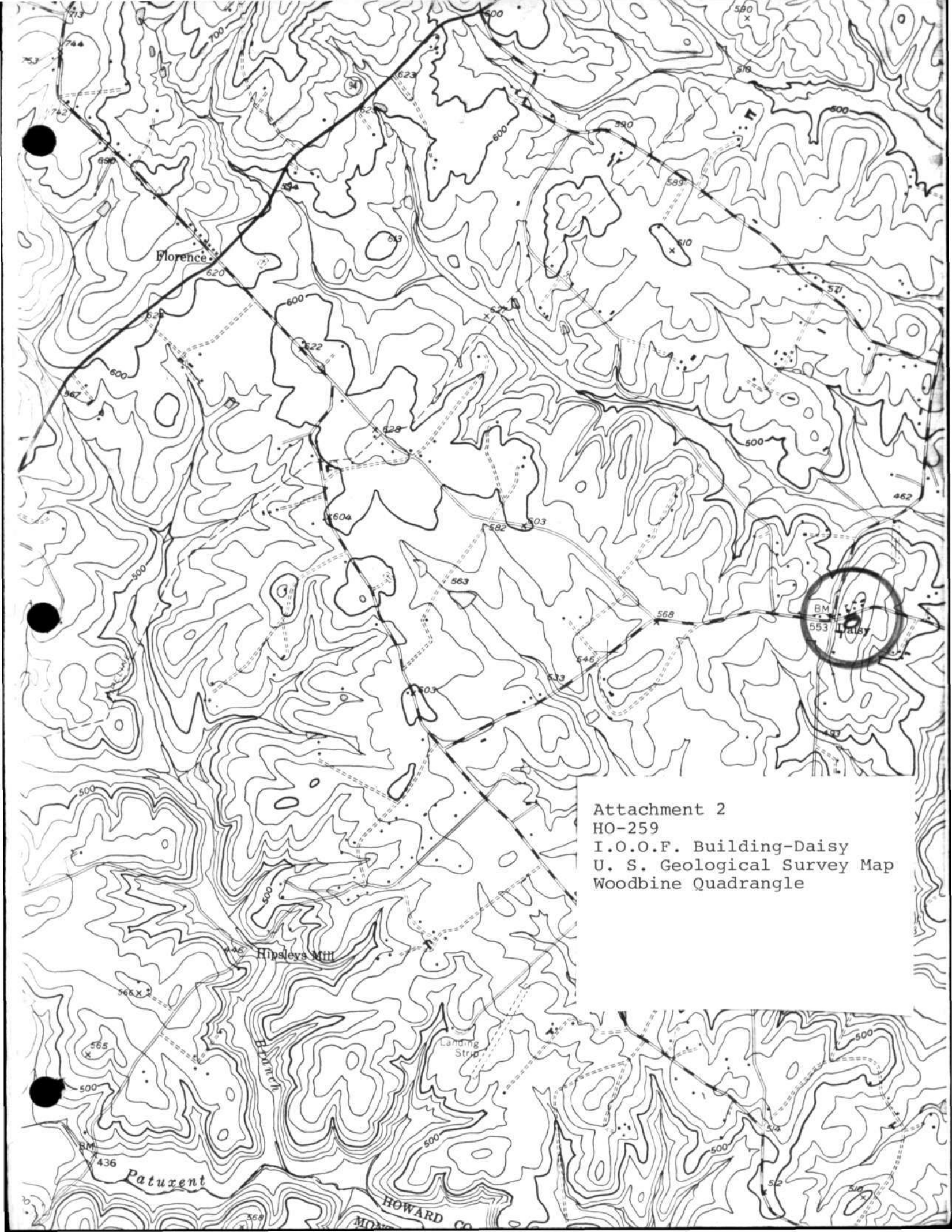

This rural community structure is located on the south side of Union Chapel Road very close to the intersection with Daisy Road. Constructed in 1915 as the town of Daisy was beginning to grow, it is located nearly across the street from the Daisy Trading Post (HO- 258). The structure was built by A. E. Millinix and family, local woodworkers and community residents.

Constructed as a social hall it was host to community plays, dinners, dances etc. The organization of the IOOF, founded for purposes of encouraging 'Prohibition' of alcoholic beverages, was an international social organization. The building is unoccupied and not very well secured of late.

The building is a simple gabled frame structure, one and one-half stories, situated on stone foundations. The rectangular plan is three bays at the gable end, and four bays along the sides. Basically in its original form, there is a small shed addition at the southwest corner. The building retains most of its ornamental woodwork and character defining elements. Carved cornice board and raking mouldings are present on the more highly decorated gable-end fronting Union Chapel Road. This end serves as the main entrance for the structure. It seems the original doors may have been lost, and windows at the front have been boarded with plywood. The small decorative window and associated trim-work, centered at the attic level on this façade, is in

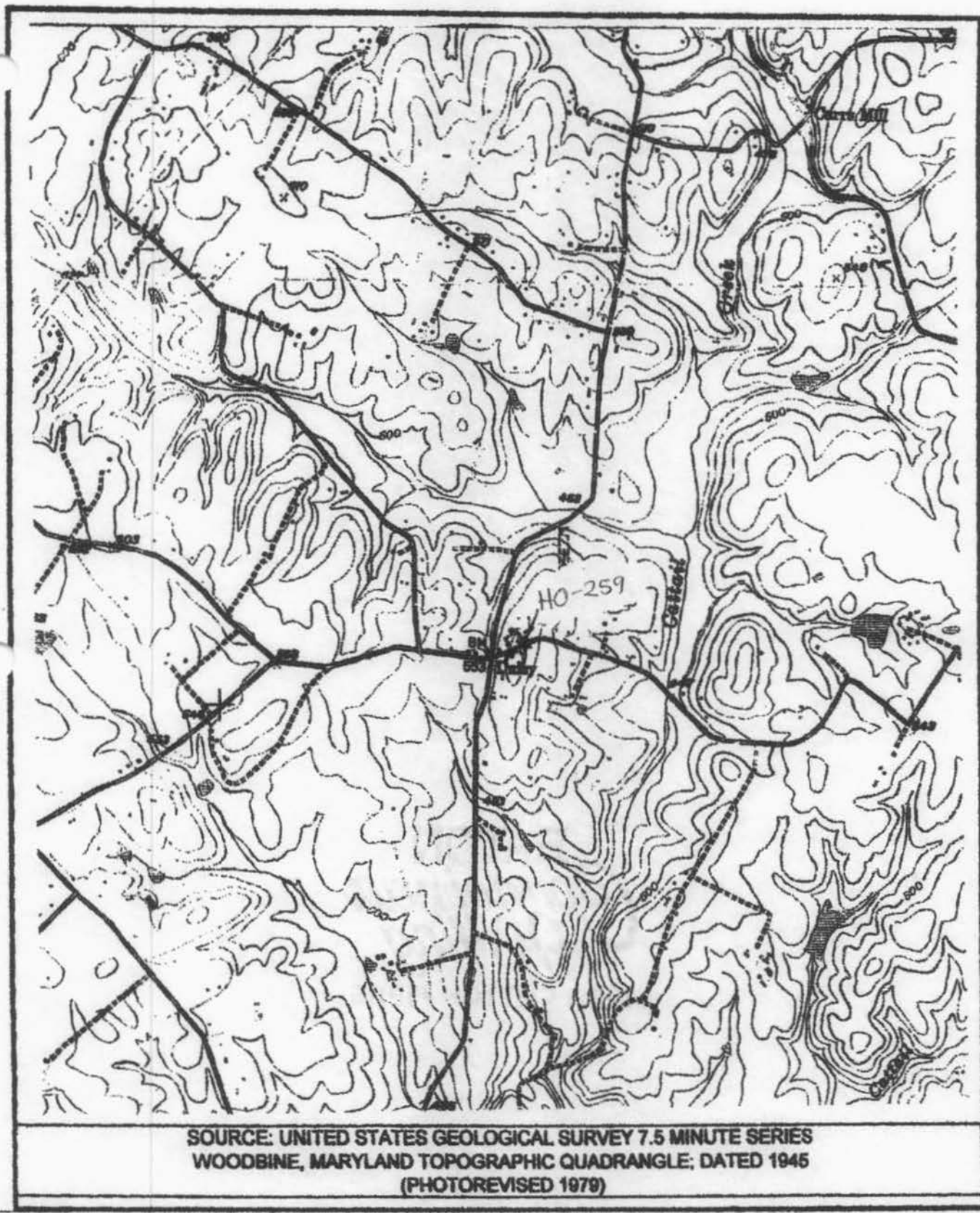

fair condition. The fish-scale shingles at the attic level of this gable end are also in fairly good condition. The paint has worn. There is great need to care for these elements overall.

Windows along the side and rear elevations are not boarded. The two-over- two, double-hung sash, wooden windows are intact. The metal roof is seriously rusted, failing and missing in sections. The condition of the building is slowly deteriorating with neglect. But at this moment in time, the building still retains its vernacular features and character. The style and craftsmanship reflected in the building support consideration of National Register eligibility under criterion C. The building's association with the I.O.O.F. and its role in the development of this small rural village of Daisy also encourages eligibility under Criterion A.
