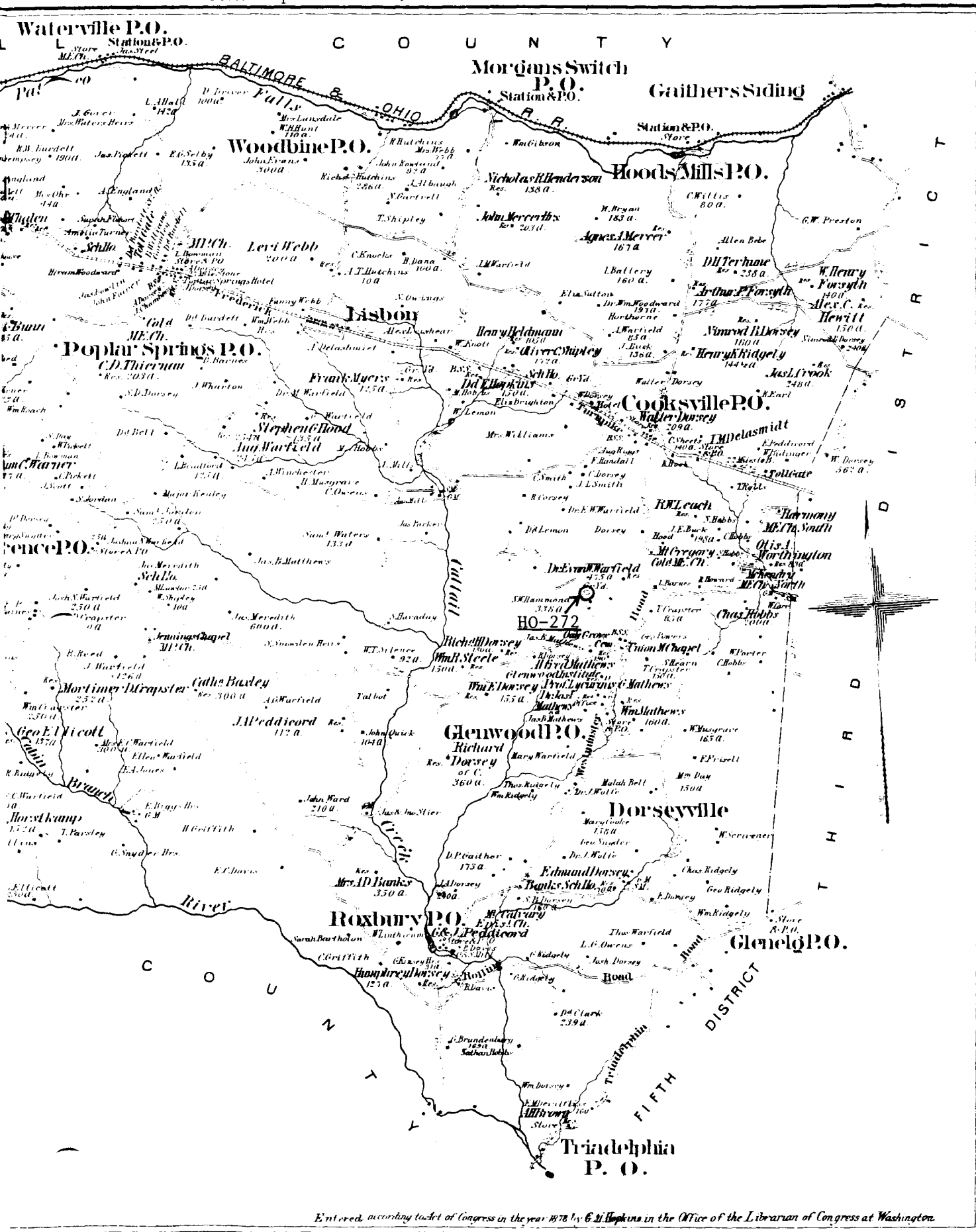
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Warfield Cemetery

The cemetery is surrounded by a stone wall. A nearby sign (near Route 97) reads:

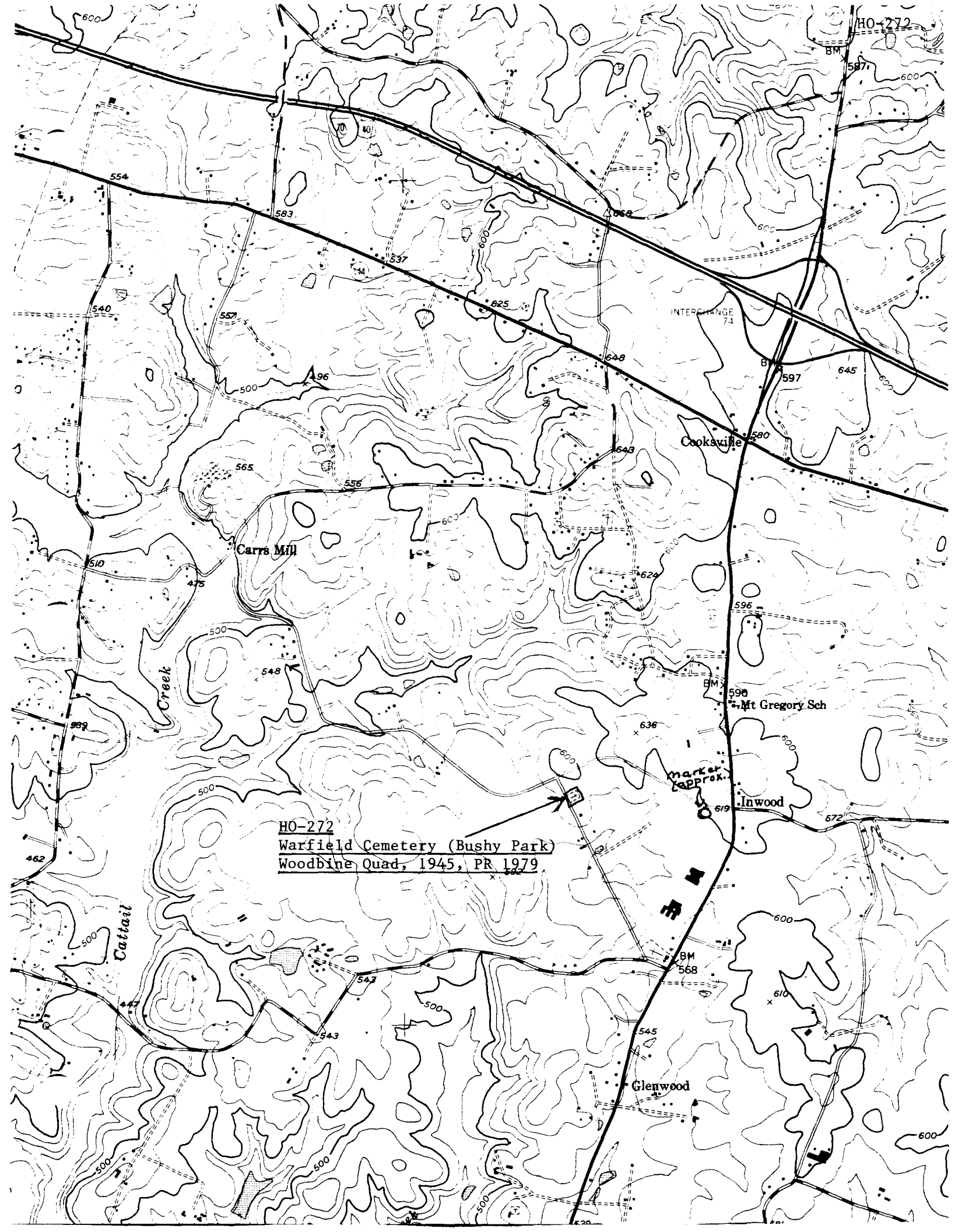
Dr. Charles Alexander Warfield
