**Summary Paragraph** Odenton Masonic Lodge No. 209 is a two-story frame meeting hall constructed in 1912, located on the south side of Odenton Road in Odenton, Maryland. The rectangular building measures 5 bays by 3 bays and is covered by a gable roof with a pronounced flare or “kick” and deep overhanging eaves. A small kitchen wing projects to the rear. The entrance comprises paneled double doors surrounded by an elaborate Colonial Revival architrave. Windows throughout the building are wooden two-over-two sash.

**Narrative Description** The building is a Colonial Revival-influenced white two-story frame structure containing an estimated 3,728 square feet of above-grade floor area. The construction was begun in 1909 and completed in 1912. The kitchen was added to the rear of the building sometime after 1912. The building stands on a rectangular lot containing approximately one-quarter acre at the southeast corner of Odenton Road and Waco Avenue. The foundation is poured concrete and concrete block on concrete footings. The exterior is sheathed in asbestos shingles; the gable roof has asphalt shingle covering.

**EXTERIOR: North Facade** – The principal entrance is located in the rightmost bay. The door surround, with fanlight, pediment, and dentilled cornice, is the most elaborate exterior architectural feature of the building, and appears to have been derived from the entrance of the Hammond-Harwood House (1774) in Annapolis. The front porch is concrete with decorative balusters. A lighted Masonic symbol, probably dating from the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century, is located above the entrance. The remaining first-floor bays are defined by two-over-two sash with louvered shutters (fabricated in 2019 to replicate original fabric). Five identical windows mark the five bays of the second story.

**East Side** -- On the first floor there are two double hung windows. On the second floor there is an apsidal protrusion measuring one foot wide by two feet deep, topped by a gable. The flare of the gable roof is most evident from the east and west ends. Eaves are finished with a simple boxed cornice with returns.

**South Side (Rear)** -- The first floor is lighted by a pair of two-over-two double-hung windows and has a transomed secondary exit accessed by a handicap ramp constructed with pressure treated lumber which was added in 2018. A one-story kitchen wing approximately 23 feet wide projects from the western side of this elevation. The wing has an asymmetrical gable roof with overhanging eaves. On the second floor of the main block are four double hung windows and a fire exit. A brick chimney rises from the lower slope of the roof.

**West Side** -- The west side of the main block has three two-over-two windows evenly spaced across the second story; the lower level is unfenestrated. A small pedimented projection at the northern corner provides an entrance to the basement. The kitchen addition is approximately 15 feet wide, and is spanned by a wooden entrance porch.

## **INTERIOR:**

**Entryway** - The front door opens into an entryway that allows access to the Social Hall, basement stairs, and a staircase leading to the second floor. Dominant architectural features include the decorative wooden staircase, wainscoting throughout the entryway, paneled wooden interior and exterior doors, fluted door frames with cornices, and tall, paneled woodwork over a door on the rear wall that opens into a rest room. All of the woodwork is varnished and most is original to the building. Wall treatments are painted plaster above wainscoting. Modern vinyl floor tile surrounds a circular Masonic emblem believed to made of linoleum or a rubberized material; the emblem predates 1945. The chandelier is a modern replacement and is not representative of the original type.

**Social Hall** - Entry to the Social Hall is by way of pocket doors with fluted wood framing and paneling above. The Social Hall has wainscoting throughout, painted plaster walls above the wainscoting, and sash windows with fluted wooden frames. A drop ceiling is fitted with modern acoustical ceiling tiles and fluorescent lights. During restoration work, a decorative metal cornice was discovered near the ceiling, and behind the cornice, a decorative frieze stenciled on the upper wall; these elements were preserved in place. A paneled wooden interior door with tall, paneled woodwork above the door opens into a rest room. A recently installed exterior rear door leads to the parking area. Modern vinyl tile covers the floor of the Social Hall.

**Kitchen** - The kitchen is reached through the Social Hall. The kitchen contains modern appliances and work surfaces, a modern drop ceiling with fluorescent lights, and a mix of old and new wooden cabinets. A pressed metal ceiling remains in place above the drop ceiling. A Vulcan gas stove dates to the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century. An original interior door opens into a utility closet. An original exterior door opens onto the side porch. Modern vinyl tile covers the kitchen floor.

**Staircase** - The decorative staircase in the entryway is original and intact, with paneled newel post and balustrade made of varnished wood. An intermediate landing reverses the direction of the stairs. The steps are covered with wall-to-wall carpet. The upper stair landing has two varnished wooden interior doors with fluted wood framing and cornices; the doors lead to small rooms. The stair landing also has wall-to-wall carpet and two closets.

**Preparation Room** - The Preparation Room, located off the second-floor stair landing, housed special or ceremonial garments worn by Masons and members of the Order of the Eastern Star during meetings. A sash window faces north. Three closets retain their original doors, two paneled and one made of wainscoting to match the surrounding wall. One closet provides access to the attic via a wooden ladder attached to a wall inside the closet. There is a connecting interior door leading into the Meeting Room.

**Meeting Room** - The second-floor Meeting Room corresponds to the first-floor Social Hall in size, location, and footprint. The Meeting Room has modern wood paneling instead of wainscoting. Above the paneling, the walls are painted blue, indicating that this building housed a blue lodge or one that supported the first three degrees of Freemasonry. The barrel arch ceiling, installed in 1948-1949, replaced the original flat ceiling and part of the attic. East and west arched alcoves in the Meeting Room house podiums and neon lighting for the Worshipful Master and Senior Warden respectively, but no furniture remains. Raised platforms for the Masons' chairs still exist against the north and south walls, and a podium for the Junior Warden against the south wall. Wall-to-wall carpet covers the floor. Modern indirect fluorescent lighting has been installed on top of art deco wall coves added in 1948-1949. Ceiling fans and spotlights at the top of the barrel arch survive from 1948-1949. An emergency exit door opens onto a fire escape.

**Ante Room** - The Ante Room opens off the second-floor stair landing. In this room, Masons signed in and presented their credentials to the Tyler before entering the Meeting Room. An interior connecting door was part of a door knocking ritual that accompanied entrance into the Meeting Room. The Ante Room now serves as an office for the Odenton Heritage Society. It has one sash window facing south.

**Basement** - The basement is an unfinished space with a concrete floor and concrete foundation walls. The locations of a coal furnace and coal chute facing Odenton Road are visible. A gas furnace occupies part of the basement.

**Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph** Odenton Masonic Lodge No. 209 is significant under Criterion C as a well-preserved representative example of a type of fraternal hall characteristic of small communities in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its interior organization reflects a processual movement from more public spaces to increasingly private areas associated with Masonic practice. The entry hall and Social Hall on the first floor are separated by a decorative staircase from upper-story spaces dedicated to specific aspects of Masonic ritual. The stair provides access to the Preparation Room where Masonic regalia is donned, and the Ante Room where members' credentials are challenged, finally entering the Lodge Hall whose furnishings conform to the hierarchy of the organization. The building retains a high degree of integrity and recently benefited from a sensitive campaign of rehabilitation.

**Period of Significance – 1912 – 1971:** The period of significance begins with the completion of the building in 1912 and extends to a date fifty years in the past. The building remained in continuous use by the Masons until 2001 when they built a new lodge in a different Odenton location. The Odenton Heritage Society, Inc. purchased the building in 2001 and has maintained its historic character.

Odenton, Maryland is located in Anne Arundel County, 20 miles south of Baltimore, 30 miles north of Washington, D. C. and 15 miles northwest of Annapolis. The town of Odenton grew around the junction of the Annapolis and Elk Ridge Railroad, which opened in 1840, and the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad which opened in 1872. Odenton quickly became the most important junction town in central Maryland. Since 1840, when the steam-powered Annapolis and Elk Ridge Railroad was built, Odenton maintained its reputation as a railroad town. But even though innumerable conductors and passengers have navigated through the place there is more to the community's identity than tracks and bridges. The railroads employed scores of residents, and the town was dotted with facilities that kept the trains running. Although the railroads had a great role in the development of Odenton, the railroads were also a great value in bringing Masons from all over to Odenton, committed to their mission to unite and then built their most lasting monument – Odenton Lodge No. 209, AF&AM. The original town center along Odenton Road is a local Historic District in Anne Arundel County. Restored homes, churches, community buildings, and railroad structures dating from 1872 to 1950 commemorate Odenton's place in local and regional history.

**Narrative Statement of Significance:**

The following paragraphs are excerpted from a historical sketch prepared ca. 1958 by longtime Masonic Lodge Secretary, J. Irving Waters:

Odenton Lodge No. 209 was granted a charter on May 12, 1908 by the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Maryland. The charter was signed by Bro. Thomas J. Shryock, who had at that time been Grand Master of Masons in Maryland for some 27 years.

The men who formed the first nucleus of Odenton Lodge were of diverse backgrounds – a fact which has remained typical of Odenton Lodge, and which is, indeed, typical of Masonry, which unites men of every country, sect, and opinion. Bro. Downs, the Worshipful Master, had been a school teacher at one time, and subsequently worked for the federal government at the Customs House in Baltimore. Bro. J. Asa Warfield (1868 - 1954), a carpenter, builder, and farmer, was primarily responsible for the construction of the building and served as the second Worshipful Master. Bro. Bier – usually known as “Uncle Bob” – worked at the Library of Congress and served as Sunday School superintendent at Bethel Church, which was located within what is now Fort Meade. Bro. Ryon was a physician. Bro. Silver was a storekeeper and a member of the Jewish faith. These men, coming as they did from several walks of life, and differing widely even in their religious beliefs, had one very important characteristic in common: they were all Masons, and as such, built their most lasting monument – Odenton Lodge No. 209, AF&AM.

For some time after the lodge was chartered, it met in the old school building located between the present Temple and Brodsky’s store. It was, of course, essential that the lodge build a home of its own. The Odenton Masonic Lodge elected John Watts Treasurer of the lodge in December 1908. Five months later, he conveyed family-owned land to the lodge for their building. To that end, money was obtained from several sources. A part of the necessary amount was obtained by means of a bank loan. A number of the brethren furnished sums of money, regarding them as donations, and expecting no repayment. Much to their surprise, all these sums were gradually repaid, until by 1920 the entire indebtedness incurred in connection with the construction of the Temple had been retired, and the mortgage burned.

Actual construction of the building was under the supervision of Bro. Warfield, who did a great deal of the work himself. He was assisted by many of the brethren, who gave generously of their time, their skills, and their aching backs. The Masons purchased some of the lumber from Joseph T. Steinacker in Baltimore. By 1912, the building was completed, and it has served well ever since.

Being located near a large military reservation, Odenton Lodge has, since early in its history, enjoyed a close relationship with our Masonic brethren in the armed forces and has served as host to many Masons who were far from their home lodges. During World War I, the lodge, only ten years old at the time – raised approximately 200 candidates, of whom the greater majority was military personnel, and about 50 percent of whom were raised as courtesies to other jurisdictions. Meetings were held three times weekly – on Monday and Wednesday nights and on Saturday afternoons. Degrees were conferred upon candidates from almost every state in the Union. Many visitors were Masons from foreign countries. Sometimes as many as 75 visitors were present at a single communication.

Grand Master Shryock instructed the Worshipful Master – then Secretary, Bro. J. Irving Waters, who was Master of Odenton Lodge in 1918, 1919, and 1920 – to “feed them” at

every meeting, and to send the bills to the Grand Lodge. His instructions were followed and every meeting was followed by a collation which might consist of everything from a hot dog to a turkey dinner -- a tradition which has continued. The “Dough Boys” from Fort Meade turned out by platoons to partake of the refreshments offered by this little “country lodge.”

After World War I, Odenton Lodge continued to welcome the Masons and the “Dough Boys” who found themselves stationed at Fort Meade. Many of the officers and enlisted men at the post became Masons in Odenton Lodge. Many of them served as officers of the lodge, and several were honored by election to the position of Worshipful Master. As a consequence, Odenton Lodge has members scattered all over the world, and one is likely to encounter Masons who have visited Odenton wherever one goes.

In 1948, Bro. Ephraim Winer, President of National Plastics and a member of Cassia Lodge No. 45, funded a remodeling of the lodge interior.

Over the years the building has been home to Odenton Lodge No. 209 AF&AM, Odenton Chapter No. 209 OES, Jobs Daughters Chapter No. 46, The Order of the Eastern Star #29, Demolay Chapters and Concordia Royal Arch Chapter No.1. The masonic order is not only a fraternal organization but is also the sponsor of many charities – Shrine Hospitals, Eye Banks, Burn Centers and many others.

The Masons relocated to a new lodge building in 2001, and the Old Masonic Hall was purchased by the Odenton Heritage Society with financial assistance from the Anne Arundel County MD Capital Projects Association (Deed is dated June 15, 2001) and is now known as the Odenton Heritage Society’s Historical Center. From 2001 – 2015, the all-volunteer group, under the guidance and regulations of the Maryland Historical Trust, installed a new roof on the Masonic Hall, completed repairs including electrical work, a new HVAC system, much-needed exterior repairs around the base of the building, new restrooms, and an access door entrance that included a handicap ramp.

The Old Masonic Hall is now totally ADA-compliant. From 2017 through 2020, the group continued renovations to the exterior of the building which include replacing the front porch and steps, scraping and painting doors and trim work, restoring the original fanlight window over the front door, painting of the handicap ramp and painting of the Masonic lighted symbol above the doors. A major part of the renovation was the removal of the plywood from all of the windows, front and side, also repairing and replacing broken window panes and the installation of new custom made shutters to the front side of the building.

The Old Masonic Hall now serves as a local history museum, public archives, the Odenton Heritage Society’s administrative office, and a community meeting place. The museum houses exhibits that educate visitors on how railroads have influenced the growth and development of Odenton since the 1860s. The museum features objects, period settings, photographs, and AV presentations about railroad history, railroad workers, and the town itself – homes and neighborhoods, community organizations, stores, churches, and businesses in the local Historic District and surrounding areas. Visitors can view artifacts from the railroad, military, historic

homes, churches, and even baseball since the establishment of Odenton in 1872. The Odenton Heritage Society writes and publishes the ‘Heritage Times’ news journal for members and the community, and also hosts community events, educational programs and fundraising.

The Odenton Heritage Society was presented the Best of Maryland Community Choice Award from statewide nonprofit historic preservation organization Preservation Maryland on August 27, 2020. The award cited the Odenton Heritage Society as “a model for a scaled and sustainable approach to local preservation – it is exactly the type of work that Preservation Maryland is proud to elevate to the state and national level.”

On November 9, 2020 “The Daily Record” newspaper presented the Odenton Heritage Society its award of “Excellence in Construction for Historic Preservation” for work in completing the restoration of the Old Masonic Hall.






