## Summary Description:

Area K, or site 18AN990, is a complex of World War I era military training features on the Fort George G. Meade property in western Anne Arundel County. The site is situated amidst residential development, on a wooded high terrace overlooking an unnamed tributary of Severn Run. Soils at the site are primarily of the Downer-Hammonton and Russett-Christiana-Hambrook complexes. The surrounding landscape ranges from suburban to semi-rural land use.

The site was first recorded in 1993. At that time, the US Army Corps of Engineers was developing a Cultural Resource Management Plan for Fort George G. Meade. This was being prepared to comply with Army Regulation 420-40 and the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA), as amended. The 1993 Phase I survey in the vicinity of 18AN990 entailed the excavation of a total of 389 shovel test pits (STPs) placed at 20 m intervals. Shovel tests measured between 35 and 50 cm in diameter and were excavated to at least 50 cm below surface, or 10 cm into sterile subsoil, whichever came first. Soils were removed by natural strata and were sifted through hardware cloth. The position of each shovel test, the depths of individual soil horizons, and the presence or absence of cultural material was recorded in the field on standardized forms. In addition, any areas devoid of vegetation were examined visually for cultural materials.

Of the 389 shovel tests excavated, only 3 widely separated STPs yielded artifacts. These artifacts consisted of modern bottle glass, coal, and charcoal. These artifacts were not inventoried in the full site report and, thus, are not included in the tables above. Numerous surface features associated with military training exercises were identified throughout the site area, especially in the western portion. These features included trenches, fox holes, and rifle pits and constituted 18AN990. One trench was of a zig-zag variety. This type of trench was typical of World War I tactics, and probably dates from the earliest stages of military activity at Fort Meade. The site could be from the period of the 1917-1918 Camp Meade Cantonment or from that of the military training camps held at Camp Meade during the 1920s. The fox holes and rifle pits may date from these periods or from training exercises during the period immediately preceding and during World War II. This largely intact military training landscape provides a potential to differentiate World War I and later earthworks, and to study the historical development of training behavior in the US Army, relative to the changes in technology and battlefield tactics during the major conflicts of the 20th century.

The site was briefly examined again in 2003. At the request of the US Army's Department of Public Works-Environmental Management Office at Fort George G. Meade, a combined Phase I/II investigation was conducted on several previously identified archeological sites at Fort Meade. The investigation was warranted because a 50 year lease was signed in 2002 on 1,000 acres of property at the installation for the construction of approximately 308 new family housing units (for military families), ancillary support facilities, and associated storm water management and other facilities. The construction constituted an undertaking that was subject to the requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended. The archeological studies were also carried out in accordance with Army Regulation 200-4 and the Archeological Resources Protection Act of 1979, which requires that all archeological investigations on federal property be carried out by permit issued by the Federal land manager.

The 2003 project at 18AN990 was cataloged by researchers as a Phase II project, but no actual excavation was carried out. Phase II documentation was limited to walkover survey, photography, and mapping using Global Position System (GPS) hardware. In total, 46 military features were documented. Archeological excavation was deemed unlikely to yield additional information, and the photo-documentation and surveying work probably provides an adequate accounting of the site for future researchers.
