Summary Description:

The Edwards Site (18AP56) is a deposit of archeological remains associated with the early urban history of Annapolis, Maryland, and specifically associated with an 18th or 19th century standing townhome know as the James Williams Building (AA-687). The site is situated at 1 State Circle opposite the State House building in the center of downtown Annapolis. It is near the intersection of State Circle and Francis Street. The landscape of the site is heavily developed as an urban area. Soils at the site are Collington and Wist sandy loams as well as some human transported soils.

The building at 1 State Circle is of uncertain age. It is a vernacular design with a large central chimney (a rare feature in Annapolis). The exterior of the first storey has been modified over the years, but much of its original narrow clapboarding remains, as well as four 6/6 2nd storey windows. It sits on a brick foundation. This particular house is more like structures commonly found in New England in the early 18th century than buildings from the period in Annapolis. However, it is not entirely certain that the house dates to the early 18th century. The lot history describes only brick structures in the location until the early 19th century. But at least one architectural analysis made when the building was being renovated in the late 20th century suggested that the framing was early 18th century (prior to 1740) in age. Unfortunately, very little documentary research or architectural analyses specific to the building are available at MHT.

The first documented archeological work at the site occurred in the winter of 1989-1990. Archaeology in Annapolis, a cooperative program between the University of Maryland, College Park and the Historic Annapolis Foundation, conducted the excavations in order to satisfy the conditions for compliance set forth in the Annotated Code of Maryland, Article 83b, sections 5-617 and 5-618, prior to the undergrounding of electrical wires by the City of Annapolis. Funding for what was known as the State Circle Archaeological Project was provided by a matching grant from the Maryland State Department of General Services and the City of Annapolis. In the vicinity of 18AP56, the construction work was to entail the extension of the corner of State Circle and Francis Street and the undergrounding of several utilities.

A single 91 X 152 cm (3 X 5 ft) test unit was excavated on this site to look for possible early edges of State Circle and Francis Street, and to recover information about earlier levels of these streets. Excavation also investigated the relationship of this unit with other units located on Francis Street (see synopsis reports for 18AP54 and 18AP55). The unit was located in the street, abutting the curb. The long axis of the unit was parallel with the front of the house and Francis Street. The brick paving covering the surface of the excavated unit was removed using a jackhammer, and then any underlying concrete was removed by the same means or with sledge hammers. Following this, the unit was excavated by shovel skimming and troweling in natural stratigraphic levels: allowing for precise definition of chronological sequences and feature identification. However, if a stratigraphic level was greater than 15 cm (6 in) in depth, the layer was excavated in arbitrary levels. Soil removed during hand excavation was screened through hardware cloth with the exception of substantial fill levels primarily of 20th century origin. These were sampled, with approximately 33% of fill being screened. The excavated unit was then backfilled in several 15 cm levels which were each tamped by a mechanical tamper before additional fill was added. Features and profiles exposed during excavation were mapped in place. Both soil samples and flotation samples were taken from all intact cultural layers, but no report of their analysis is available at MHT.

Excavation at 18AP56 revealed several former road surfaces and beds located within the unit. The first three levels encountered were the brick road surface, sand bed, and concrete bed of the 1902-1990 aggregate brick road around State Circle. The modern road was underlain by a series of overlapping clay and sand road beds that dated from the 19th and 18th centuries. This road bed features appeared to be in relative stratigraphic order based on the diagnostic artifacts found in association with the features. Eventually a yard surface was reached (Level N), which probably dated to the period 1720-1765 based on artifact finds. Two additional yard surfaces were noted below this.

The deepest yard level (Level R) revealed a post hole and several associated postmolds near the base of the level, which dates at least to the early 18th century. The Terminus Post Quem for the single artifact recovered within the post hole is 1640 (a piece of tin-glazed earthenware, which was manufactured between 1640 and 1800). A 1718 Survey of Annapolis by James Stoddert describes a locust post marking the corner of Francis Street and State Circle. It is speculated that the posthole and postmolds may represent the corner marker and edges of the original street. The levels below Level R and the posthole/mold features were subsoil.

The artifact catalog provided in the full site report for the State Circle project is coded. Unfortunately, a legend is not provided. A total of 1403 miscellaneous objects were retained from the excavations. Two prehistoric items (see above) were also recovered. Diagnostic materials described on a 1990 site file prepared for MHT include painted pearlware, creamware, tin glazed earthenware, trailed slipware, transfer printed whitewares, painted whiteware, Canton porcelain, English brown stoneware, and Rhenish blue and gray stoneware. Since no tallies of these objects are available, they are simply included as "miscellaneous objects" in the tables above.

The excavations at 18AP56 did provide evidence of earlier manifestation of State Circle and Francis Street. The work showed that the site does preserved intact cultural remains, features, and living surfaces. With additional work, this site could yield information of relevance to early American history, and possibly to Maryland's Colonial history as well. A note in MHT site files states that intact deposits are situated beneath the crawl space of the house, but no information about the work that led to this discovery is provided. The site should be considered a significant archeological report.
