Phase II	This report describes the findings of a testing and data recovery project conducted by Archaeology in Annapolis (AIA) in the basement of the Adams-Kilty House (18AP107) during the summer of 2005. The work was carried out to satisfy Archaeology in Annapolis' mission to promote better understanding of Annapolis' diverse past through the interpretation of material culture. This project was geared specifically towards understanding the contributions of African-Americans to the city's history. The AIA consortium's work is largely publically funded both through state funds (the University of Maryland) and grants from the City of Annapolis.	-Determine how African-Americans living and working in the basement space are utilizing the landscape.
Phase III		-Assess whether African-Americans in the city of Annapolis were practicing some form of African Diasporic religion.

## Research Potential:

Ultimately evidence of disturbance within the basement of the Adams-Kilty House (18AP107) precluded making definitive determinations regarding the only potential significant features identified at 18AP107. Based on these findings, the site does not appear to be capable of addressing ongoing research questions related to Maryland history.

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
