## Research Potential:

Site 18FR72 is of great interest because it represents the only material remains of the last native village in Maryland of the historically important Piscataway tribe. Only a very small percentage of the site has been excavated, and that only by untrained undergraduates. Interpretation of the site (and Piscataway history) could certainly be augmented by additional work at the site by professionally trained and experienced archeologists (particularly those committed to publishing their findings).
