Phase I		<b>Project Justification:</b>
Phase II	<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Archeological research was conducted prior to road improvements and extension in the vicinity of the site, which would impact any archeological deposits in the area. The Phase I investigation that initially identified the site interpreted it as being reasonably intact, and as containing 19th century deposits. Phase II work was warranted as the road construction project could not be altered to avoid the site.

<b>Project Objectives:</b>
-Determine the horizontal limits of the site. The site boundaries proposed during Phase Ib were based on the excavation of a relatively few shovel tests, and the site boundaries require further refinement.
-Determine the occupational history of Site 18MO327, if it contains both industrial (blacksmithing) and domestic remains, and what time span is represented.
-If contexts are primarily domestic, determine the ethnic/racial groups living there and their relative socioeconomic status. If contexts are primarily industrial determine the date range of the property's use and what level of technology was utilized there.
-Assess the level of preservation of the archeological resources within the site (including feature integrity and floral/faunal preservation).
-Assess whether the scientific content of the site is significant to

better understanding the local or regional history of the area, and if it is potentially eligible to the NRHP.

Research Potential:

The Phase II investigations clearly indicated that all of the site soils at 18MO327 were bulldozed at the time the primary site structure was demolished, and that earthmoving has destroyed any integrity that the site may have once possessed. Thus, the site is not considered to retain any significant research value.

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
