Project Justification:

At the direction of the Maryland Historical Trust, the Waterman Realty Company of Chester Maryland requested a Phase II archaeological survey of approximately 54 acres at TAX MAP 59A, GRID 11, PARCEL 36 Queenstown, Maryland, referred to as the Wheatlands Site, state record number 18QU1038. An earlier Phase I survey had identified five archaeological cluster areas within the proposed construction area containing archaeological remains. The goal was to assess potential impact of proposed construction on any cultural resources that may be present at the location.

Research Potential:

The areas within the project area of potential effect were determined to be not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places and were therefore cleared for development. Several other sites on the property may be archaeologically significant but would not be impacted by the development project. These areas include the ruins of the plantation, a deeply-buried brick feature, and a road-bridge feature. A potential prehistoric component may also be investigated further.
