Project Justification:
This report describes a salvage archeology project conducted in 1981 at Notley Hall (18ST75). The work was undertaken in order to examine areas slated (at the time) to be disturbed by construction related to the restoration of the structure and to recover evidence pertaining to the Hall's date of construction. In so doing, a persistent local tradition which holds that the Hall is a survivor of a larger, older structure was also tested.

Project Objectives:
-Test the traditional beliefs about the age of the extant structure.
-Examine extensively areas slated to be disturbed by construction related to the restoration of the Hall.

Research Potential:

Based on the 1981 research at 18ST75, Upper Notley appears to be a significant archeological resource. Intact features and artifact deposits were encountered in situ with diagnostic materials. The research results were useful in answer questions about the site's history and the construction details of Notley Hall. Though the foundation remnants of the earlier dwelling at 18ST75 appear to have been capped during the construction that followed the 1981 work, it is conceivable that outbuildings or other cultural deposits may be present in the fields surrounding the site. 18ST75 should continue to be considered a significant archeological resource.

Project Justification:
This fieldwork followed an effort to research the site's history and examine collections from Notley Hall in the possession of Miss Laura Holmes, Ms. Tina Martin, and the Maryland Archaeological Conservation Laboratory. The background research was done by Skylar Bauer as part of her senior thesis project at St. Mary's College of Maryland. This technical report brings together that background research and the results of the 2011 fieldwork, which was supervised by both Bauer and Julia A. King.

Project Objectives:
Students from St. Mary's College of Maryland had the opportunity to undertake a shovel test survey of the site to more firmly establish the site's spatial and chronological boundaries.
